# THE LASER THERAPY 'MAKE-OVER' CONTINUES: AVE ATQUE VALE (HAIL AND FAREWELL)

Welcome, dear readers, to the second issue of the journal for 2019 and Volume 28! As you know the journal is issued quarterly, and as the years go by for me, these 'quarters' seem to become shorter and shorter (like fifths, sixths ... and so on!)... my very own 'time machine'. My first Editorial in the Pilot Issue of the journal was in 1988 ... that's 31 years ago, and from that you can see we have been in continued production for almost all of that time, with only a short hiatus around the turn of the New Millennium. However, I can safely say that we got back on track quickly, and have remained there up to and including Volume 28, thanks to all of you who have supported us by contributing articles to the journal: no articles, no journal ... please, keep on writing!!

Japan is a very seasonal country, not only for weather, but also for food, especially species of fish and fruits. As you read this, it's the end of June and in Tokyo, in the Kanto region in the middle of Japan, we are into our annual rainy season, called tsuyu (梅雨, also pronounced baiu and literally meaning "plum rain", as I have mentioned before). The season gets its name from the fact that it coincides with the season when the Japanese plums (梅, ume) ripen. In fact, the fruit from the tree prunun mume is more akin to the apricot than the true plum, but 'plums' they are commonly called and they need the rains for them to ripen, hence the name "plum rain" for the rainy season. The rain is also essential for the growth phase of rice, our staple diet, so there we have two examples of the fact that someone always benefits from something which not everyone really likes (i.e., rain)! In fact the same is true for the plums themselves. In their unripe green stage they are totally bitterly inedible, but this is the stage when they are harvested, carefully cleaned and dried, then placed layered together with rock sugar in large containers, and covered with distilled white alcohol (焼酎, shōchū). The containers are left undisturbed for at least 6 months (the longer the better), and plum wine (梅酒, umeshu) is the result, a magic metamorphosis whereby the plums give up some of their good characteristics to the rather harsh white spirit, leaving the liquor deliciously flavoured, sweet/dry, and a golden-yellow colour. The bitter green plums become soft, brown-green and plump, and are delicious to eat, but beware, they are more than slightly alcoholic!

He has more than four decades of experience in dermatological practice with lasers and other energy-based sources, and is additionally passionate about low level light therapy and photobiomodulation. Dr Vasily's special interests also include clinical applications of lasers and energy sources for skin rejuvenation, ongoing clinical research into the treatment of melasma and application of high resolution ultrasound imaging to cosmetic dermatology.

## History Was Made In April

As a historic and literally era-changing footnote to this "Hail and Farewell" theme, I would like to remind everyone about the historic abdication of our Japanese Emperor Akihito after 30 years on the Chrysanthemum Throne. In recent history, this had not happened in more than 200 years. Emperor Akihito has been replaced by his son, the new Emperor Naruhito, whose formal enthronement will be in October of this year. With that change, one era came to an end on April 30th, the Heisei era, and a new era, Reiwa (令: rei, order, and 和: wa, harmony) began: the official translation from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs is "beautiful harmony". For those of you who know Japan and things Japanese, you will know that we use two methods of counting the passing of time: one is the same as the Western style, so that will not change. 2019 will remain 2019. There is a final, very personal chapter to my "Hail and Farewell" Editorial. I have been an Executive Committee member for the World Federation of Societies for Lasers in Surgery and Medicine since its inception in 2005 as the WFSLMS Secretary-General, in addition to my role in the NPO WFSLMS, We are

none of us getting any younger, and as the years pile up I began to feel it was appropriate to hand over the reins to someone younger than I. This was not a decision that I have taken lightly, because a lot of blood, sweat and tears have gone into keeping the WFSLMS going over these 14 years with the strong backing of NPO WFSLMS.

Accordingly, I contacted Professor Leonardo Longo, Florence, Italy, in March of this year, and I told him that, in light of my advancing years, I would like to hand over the mantle of the WFSLMS Secretary-General, including the requirement to move the Secretariat of the Federation from Tokyo where it has been since 2005. I sounded Prof Longo out about the possibility that he might be an appropriate person to take over the post, and to my delight he agreed, provided the WFSLMS Executive Committee went along with the idea and no other candidate stepped forward. I then wrote the Executive Committee members with the proposal, and the decision was unanimous to approve the move of the Secretariat to Florence, with Prof Longo taking

over as Secretary-General.

By the time you read this, the World Laser Medicine Congress (WLMC) will have taken place in Taipei, Taiwan, and it was at that meeting that this decision was to be announced and ratified. To make sure that this would happen correctly and democratically, I contacted Professor Ming-Chien Kao, the Honorary Congress President of the WMLC, in early May. He swiftly replied that both he and Professor Cheng-Jen Chang, the WLMC Congress President, were very sad that I had made the decision, but that they accepted my decision and moreover fully agreed with the proposal, about which they would make the formal announcement during the WLMC meeting. Well, that will already have happened when you read this, and another chapter in my own life has come to a close. It means that I will have more time to devote to Laser Therapy, and other matters, so one door may close, but another will always open.
